## U.S.-Canada Travel Tips for 2003 Annual Conference

- 1. ALA recommends that members get passports because it is easier to get back Into the United States with a U.S. passport. Applications can be downloaded from the Web site at travel.state.gov/passport\_services.html.
- 2. Get computer, cameras, and other equipment registered with Customs before leaving the U.S. When returning, there will be no question as to where your equipment was purchased.
- 3. All registration fees will be in U.S. dollars, so participants may pay as usual--check, credit card, government purchase order, etc.
- 4. If paying cash on-site In the ALA registration area, U.S. dollars will be returned as change. If paying with Canadian dollars, Canadian dollars will be returned as change. On-site fees will be In U.S. dollars. If using Canadian dollars, U.S. equivalent fees must be paid.
- 5. The rates for hotel rooms will be quoted In Canadian dollars. The Tourism Toronto Web site (www.tourismtoronto.com) has a Currency Calculator that allows conferees to see the price in U.S. dollars. If booking on your own, ALA is not responsible in cases of hotel emergencies. An on-site housing desk will be available as your advocate. The Conference Services desk in the ALA Office will be available for assistance.
- 6. Conferees can get rebates of goods and services taxes on purchases and hotel room fees. The bill has to be over \$50 and can be processed directly through Canadian Customs. Read the fine print and make sure you get the government forms and not the service-charge-company forms.
- 7. The conference will feature one Opening General Session, but two separate President's Programs. The governance-type meetings will also be separate.
- 8. Shuttle service will be offered from conference hotels to the Metro Toronto Convention Center.
- 9. Annual Conference registration will begin December 1. Hotel registration will open January 2, 2003. There will be an on-site housing desk at the ALA Midwinter Meeting, January 24-29, 2003, in Philadelphia to allow for reservations to be made in person.
- 10. When Canadian Immigration asks you why you are coming to the country, you should say you are coming to attend the ALA/CLA Annual Conference.
- 11. Under no circumstances should you tell Immigration you are entering the country to work.
