The need for librarians is on the rise; a great career is waiting for YOU:

- More than one-quarter of all librarians with master's degrees will reach the age of 65 before 2009.
- Librarianship has one of the highest median ages of any occupation (47 years old).
- Since 1998, the American Library Association (ALA) job placement center has posted substantially more job openings than job seekers. In 1/2001, 831 openings compared to 260 job seekers. In 1997, 360 openings for 436 job seekers.
- U.S. News and World Report reported (2/24/03) in the cover story on Finding Work that "Librarians are the hot ticket, with a range of employers from rural elementary schools to top-notch research universities hunting for them...Librarian jobs should be abundant for some time."

- Salaries nationwide average \$49,800 annually. UC librarian salaries (excluding University Librarians) currently range from \$37,920-\$115,800.
